



There are 42.5 million people forcibly displaced in the world, 15.2 million of them are refugees. Last year 46% of refugees were under 18 years old and 48% were female. In 2012, over 876,100 people worldwide sought asylum, meaning they were in immanent danger because of race, religion, ethnicity, social group [i.e. women], or political opinion. The largest organization that works to help resettle refugees and asylum seekers is the Catholic Church.

Easter Blessing of Food

The Easter blessing of food owes its origin to the fact that particular foods, namely, fresh meat and milk products, including eggs, were forbidden in the Middle Ages during the Lenten fast and abstinence.

When the feast of Easter brought the rigorous fast to an end, and these foods were again allowed at table, the people showed their gratitude and joy by first taking the food to church for a blessing. Moreover, they hoped that the Church's blessing on such edibles would prove a remedy for whatever harmful effects the body might have suffered from a long period of self-denial.

Today the Easter blessing of food is still celebrated in the Catholic Church. The blessing also recognizes that food itself has an important place in the Resurrection story. Proving that He was truly risen, in Luke's Gospel, Jesus asked for something to eat. He also ate with the disciples on other occasions; and in Acts, St. Peter testified that they had eaten with the risen Lord.

Although many ethnic groups celebrate the blessing, each culture has made it's own adaptations regarding the foods, prayers and ways to decorate the baskets. Each food has a symbolic meaning. The meat is a sign of abundance and the symbol of the end of Lenten penance. The hardboiled eggs symbolize the tomb and new life. Butter and cake in the shape of the lamb remind us that Jesus is the Lamb of God, sacrificed for humanity's sins. Salt may also be included because it is necessary to sustain life and a reminder to be the "salt of the earth". Candles in the basket acknowledge that Christ is the light of the world.

A Note from the Parish Nurse, Pam Dennis:

Moving along with *Healthy Lifestyles can be Fun*, let's look at the next band in the food pyramid below. This is the fourth one from the left and it is the milk group.

Milk is an important source of calcium, potassium and Vitamin D. The recommended amount of milk for your daily intake should be 3 cups of fat-free or low-fat milk. Children up to 2 years old should have whole milk.

Substitutes for milk in your diet can be in foods such as yogurt or cheese. The equivalent amounts would be 1 cup yogurt, 1 1/2 - 2 ounces of cheese. Other ways to get the milk group into your diet can be with calcium- fortified breakfast cereals or beverages, sardines or tofu made with calcium. Cheese sticks are a fun way to get kids of all ages part of the 3 cups per day or fun flavored yogurts. Cheeses can also be cut up and put on toothpicks with a grape or blueberry in between. You can use yogurt instead of sour cream in dips as well to get the necessary calcium.

Another way to introduce milk can be in low fat frozen yogurts or making pudding for a dessert or snack option. Kids can help measure the amount of milk needed in the pudding and choose what kind of bowls or cups to put it in to make it more fun. So go ahead and add 2-3 cups of dairy into your food intake each day this week.



Fields of Hope & Dream Community Gardens

March – "comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb" - so the saying goes. March is a transitional month from winter to spring, so the saying is merely an affirmation of normal seasonal weather changes. Although sometimes we experience it the other way around. One explanation of the saying is that it is astronomical. That's because in early March the constellation Leo (the Lion) is rising in the east crossing the meridian on March 20th (the spring equinox) and later in March the constellation Aries the ram (or Lamb) sets in the west.

Equinox is derived from the Latin aequus (equal) and nox (night) where day and night are about equal in length. Some people think the saying is biblical relating to Jesus' return. Jesus first appeared as the sacrificial lamb entering into Jerusalem on a donkey, but he will return as the Lion of Judah. Others attribute the saying to English playwright John Fletcher who in 1624 wrote: 'I would chuse March, for I would come in like a Lion. . . But you'd go out like a Lamb when you went to hanging' in his play - A Wife for a Month. Later in the 17th century English naturalist and writer John Ray wrote: "March hack ham [hackande = annoying] comes in like a lion, goes out like a lamb" in his Catalogue of English Proverbs. In the British American colonies the saying shows up in Ames Almanack in 1740 and in William Byrd's: Another Secret Diary. And American's 2nd president John Adams noted in his diary in 1788 "This month (March) come in like a lion, and according to the farmer's proverb it must go out like a lamb."

Our volunteer gardeners are looking for the lamb (i.e. sunshine, warming temperatures) as we've begun to start our seeds for spring planting.
