

Anointing of the Sick ~ October 1 & 2, 2011

"Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord! The prayer of faith will save the sick and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sin will be forgiven." James 5:14-15

Every year we offer all of our parishioners who have health issues a chance to celebrate the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick at the weekend Masses.

Father Mike and Father Jerry and two other priests, will celebrate this Sacrament as part of the 5 pm Mass on **October 1st and the 8:15 and 10:15 am Sunday Masses on October 2nd**. In the above quote from James, we are reminded of our mission as believers in Jesus Christ, to participate in the healing ministry of the church. This sacrament is one response to that calling. Blessed oil is used for anointing to preserve, strengthen and protect. We are an anointed people who are called to heal, comfort and support one another during times of physical, emotional and spiritual illness or trauma.

The Second Vatican Council placed this sacrament in the context of mutual prayer and concern as described in the Epistle of James. It was decided that anointing was not only for the dying, but also for those who are seriously ill. The purpose of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is "to make people holy, to build up the Body of Christ and to give worship to God." [Catholic Update, 11/94]

If you or a loved one are dealing with a chronic or terminal illness, emotional problems, injuries or facing surgery, please participate in the anointing weekend. If you are in need of this sacrament and cannot attend Mass that weekend, please contact Father Mike (262-253-2212) or me and arrangements can be made for you to receive the Anointing of the Sick at another time. You are encouraged to receive the sacrament with your family and friends present. Remember, too that you can receive this sacrament more than once.

I am Jerry Gnadt, the bald guy with beard and beret. What volunteering means to me -- and, why do I do it? As a child in a small rural, mostly Catholic, village [population - 500] plus farmers, everyone knew everybody's life history, with no secrets! Yes, we watched our behavior, making for close personal relationships -- a great opportunity to observe life. People helped each other as a way of life -- all voluntary.

When anyone needed help, somebody was there often without anyone asking for it. Example: a local farmer's entire family of ten people, including a baby, and both parents, came down with Trichinosis, a serious illness often derived from eating infected hogs.

Without government assistance programs, this family, like many others at that time, had little money to hire help. The entire community and farmers stepped up to help out. The local ladies, including my mother cared for that family, food preparation, and household maintenance 24/7. The men cared for the livestock, maintenance, chores, etc. This encompassed four weeks, plus.

This, and other events, shaped my concepts about volunteering without really knowing it. There was a need. Everyone pitched-in. It's that simple.

For my wife, Barbara, volunteering was natural. She earned a teaching degree from Marquette. She was a stay at home mom with four children, no time, for much else. With the last child in school, Barb began volunteering at St. Mary's grade school working as a mentor for young children in need. This was only one of her good works. We did other volunteering as members of Good Shepherd and St. Mary's.

Around 2000, we joined St. James, same time the new church was completed. New shrubbery and trees had just been planted around the church. Barb, ever the gardener, was concerned about the new plantings, with that particularly dry summer. She simply said, "Jerry, let's water everything before we lose them." *I was drafted*. Sounded easy enough, but more watering, was needed. She wanted to plant flowers around the church and help tend to the flowers growing around the old buildings. *So we did*.

Next, Barb heard of Sue Mangan's request for volunteers to help the Art & Environment committee. What can I say! As a free-lance writer -- I had the time. This meant so much to Barb. We helped Katie Weirl with the indoor church plants, too. So, on it goes! I didn't have a chance! I was simply volunteered by my wife. She led so well.

Later Barb became seriously ill with Alzheimer's disease and me, her full time caregiver. When I blew out my back and had to have surgery Barb was moved to assisted-living, in Menomonee Falls. After my rehab, I moved in with Barb.

While I lived at the Northfield Manor, Daryl rescued me by starting a weekly bible study group that met at my home. Barb would go to daycare and I would go home to bible study. We lived together until Barb died seven months later.

Thursday morning's senior bible study group is on-going. If you're interested, come to the great room on Thursdays at 9:00 am

Barb and I loved St. James and found many good friends. After Barb died, I really became aware that the people of St. James were good friends, and became like family. With Barb gone I didn't want to sit home alone, doing nothing. I needed to belong to something positive that would fill the void in my life and give me comfort and meaning. *I get that at St. James*. Volunteering continues to give me purpose and focus, and thankfully, many friends. I value this friendship, and doing things for others is very important to me. St. James gave me a place to contribute and belong while I focused on life without Barb.

The outreach programs need many volunteers. The Catechists, Monday morning church cleaning, St. Vincent de Paul, Field of Dreams, the choir, are some of my favorites. Getting caught up in volunteering can do that to you, bringing joy and satisfaction. I've expanded my volunteering to the funeral choir, the Field of Dreams, the parish council, a Vincentian, a trustee and more. My hope is that I can keep volunteering for a long time to come. How about You!

PRAY FOR THE "DREAM" SUNDAY - SEPT 25

We live in an age when strangers in our midst have become a source of suspicion and fear. Jesus' command for us to welcome these strangers as we would welcome Him is at odds with much of the prevailing sentiment expressed today. Debates over whether and how to address the migration phenomenon fills not only the halls of government but even community and parish halls. The historically generous American spirit has been replaced in some quarters with calls for isolation and restriction.

In this fearful environment, how is a Christian to respond? Christ's call is unchanging: we are obliged to welcome the stranger with love. [Matt 25:44-45] Through the perfect love of Christ's incarnation, death and resurrection, Jesus has conquered fear for all of his children. To be welcomed into this freedom ourselves we must be willing to welcome others.

In his Papal message for migrant and refugee day, Pope Benedict XVI stressed the importance of supporting migrant children's education. It is important that these young people be given the possibility of attending school and subsequently of being integrated into the world of work.

The DREAM [Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors] Act was pioneered by Senators Durbin [D-IL] and Hatch [R-UT]. It would allow students who entered the country before their 16th birthday, have been in the U.S. for at least five years, have a high school diploma or GED, demonstrate positive moral character and have no record of criminal activity to be eligible to receive permanent legal status [green card] by way of the DREAM Act.

Every year, hundreds of thousands of students, who were brought up in the U.S. and who did not intentionally or willfully break the law when they entered with their parents live in fear of deportation. Despite the fact that they have been integrated into our culture and consider the US their home, they are barred from joining the workforce because of their immigrant status. These are students not just from our southern boarder, but from places around the world such as the Philippines, Sudan and Albania.

Archbishop Listecki and the U.S. Catholic Bishops ask all members of the community to Pray for the DREAM on Sunday September 25. They ask for your prayers and your voice to make the DREAM of a future for our youth a reality. 
Field of Dreams Community Garden



Generation to generation – passing down the knowledge and tradition of gardening to our youth, is somewhat like seed saving. Many of the seed companies have changed their business models to selling hybrid seeds. One of the reasons to sell hybrids is so you continue to purchase seeds from them. Unlike heirloom plants and

seeds where you can take the seeds from the vegetable, dry it, and put it in an envelope during fall harvest, to plant next spring. That is similar to what we try to do with our young families that bring their children to the garden. Us "heirloom" gardeners are passing on practical knowledge, experience and traditional practices to the young families knowing that sometime, years later, their children may cherish that memory of pulling and tasting their first fresh carrot from the ground and they may want to turn over some soil in their backyard to plant a garden. Similar to passing down our faith traditions, as we try to teach our youth, Catholic teachings, traditions and values that they can use throughout their lives.
